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SEC. 2. STUDY RELATING TO CONSEQUENCES AND BENE FITS OF AMENDING THE CFAA.

3 (a) STUDY.—The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with other Federal agencies as appropriate, 4 5 shall conduct a study on the potential benefits and risks of amending section 1030 of title 18, United States Code 6 7 (commonly known as the "Computer Fraud and Abuse 8 Act"), to allow private entities to take proportional actions 9 in response to an unlawful network breach, subject to 10 oversight and regulation by a designated Federal agency. 11 (b) REPORT.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days
after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit a report
on the findings of the study conducted under subsection (a), including any recommendations, to Congress.
