Stakeholder Support on Daines' Pilot Arbitration Bill

Julia Altemus, Executive Director, Montana Wood Products Association: "There are 28 timber sales (totaling 236.4mmbf) currently affected by litigation in Region One. Unfortunately, our region continues to be ground-zero for litigation in the west. Therefore, we support Senator Daines' work to find collaborative solutions that could bring quicker resolution to objections and relief to the courts. We applaud his efforts."

Kyle Weaver, President & CEO, Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation: "Litigation against forest management proposals in Forest Service Region One and Wyoming—including collaborative projects—has impeded the agency's ability to enhance wildlife habitat, mitigate hazardous fuels and address significant insect and disease issues. RMEF fully supports Sen.
